BEHAN, JOHN HARRIS

EXHAM, JOHN HARRIS, born at westport, Jackson County, Missouri, October 25, 1845; son of Peter Bohan, a native of Ireland, and Sally (Harris) Bohan, who was born in Kentucky; attended the Westport public schools; married Victoria 25, Eaff, a step-daughter of John P. Bourke, at San Prancisco, California, in March, 1869; son, Albert P. and daughter, Henrietta, who died at age 5.

Crossed the plains to New Maxico and came to Tueson as an employee of the Quarternaster Department of the California Column; was working at the Corre Celerade Mine in gouthern Arisema, late in 1865; listed, Territorial Census, April, 1864, at Tueson, A.T., age 19, occupation, Laborer, resident in Arisema 6 menths; went to Prescott, A.T., in 1864 and engaged in cutting hay for forage at Port Whipple and in freighting to the mines with bull teams; located 100 feet on the Great Eastern Lode; as a mining claim in the Walker District, January 11, 1865.

Served as Beputy under Jehn P. Beurke, Sheriff of Yavapai County, 1867-68; County Recorder and ex-officio Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Yavapai County, 1869-70; Sheriff of Yavapai County, 1871-72; member from Yavapai County, H. of R., 7th Territorial Legislature, at Tucson, 1873; Sergeant at: Arms, H. of R., 9th Territorial Legislature at Tucson, 1877; Goved to Signal, Hebave County, A.T., 1878, where he operated a hotel known as the "Yirginia House"; Hember from Hebave County, H. of R., 10th Territorial Legislature at Prescott, in January, 1879.

Heved to Tembatene late in 1879 and was appointed Deputy Sheriff at that place by C.A. Shibell, Sheriff of Pima County; appointed by Governor Presment as the first Sheriff of Cochise County, A.T., and served from rebruary 10, 1881, to January 1, 1883; was Assistant Superintendent of the Territorial Prison at Yuma when appointed Superintendent by Governor Zulick

on April 2, 1888, in place of Thomas Gates, resigned; as a result of a Court decree, surrendered control of the Prison on July 5, 1890, to grank 3. Ingalls, who had been appointed Superintendent by Governor Welfley on October 7, 1889; appointed Inspector of Quatome at \$4 per diem June 3, 1893; appointed Inspector to enforce the Chinese Exclusion Act at \$6 per diem March 12, 1894, and served until April 30, 1897.

At the outbreak of the Spanish-American war he offered his services and was employed on May 14, 1898, at Tampa, Florida, as Corral-Master at \$100 per month; transferred to Brigadier General C.F. Rumphrey, Division Quarternaster General, at Havana, Cuba, Hovember 25; promoted to Superintendent of Transportation at \$135 per menth, December 1, 1898 and served until June 5, 1899; reported by General Humphrey as clerk at \$100 per month on route to China, August 10, 1900, and was in that country during the Bener uprising; premoted to \$125 per menth at Tientsin, China, September 1; served until December 31, 1900; returned to Arisona in February, 1901.

During the construction of the Sud-Pacifico de Mexico railroad,

Col. Epes Randelph placed him in charge of the Commissary Department, with headquarters at Empalme, Simuloa; his last active work was in the summer of 1911

when he handled the commissary requirements of an engineering party sent by

Randelph to prepare plans for closing the breaks in the levees in Lever

California, Mexico through which the Colorado River was flowing into the

Imperial valley.

Said to have boos assured of appointment as Superintendent of the Arisona Pioneer's Home at Present when he was taken ill and went to the Agua Caliente het springs; returned to Tucsen where he died June 7, 1912, aged 66; interment in Evergreen Cometery, at Tucsen; his funeral was -- the - m -- of the Arisona Pioneers Historical Society of which he was a Member,
