A. Rigg of the California Column to report upon Confederate activities

in Sonora and kept the Federal authorities well advised of what trunspired on both sides of the border; left Tuceon on orders from Captain J. H. Whitlook, February 18, 1865, for Pert Liberted, and when he returned, March 15, 1865, reported that 485,000 peanes of wheat and 175,000 pounds of sorn sould be purchased in Sonora to supply the Federal troops in Arizona;
