Came to New Mexico with the Missouri Volunteers during the Mexican War and was taken prisoner by Navajo Indians; came to Arizona, 1865.

Admitted to U. S. Soldiers Home, Sawtelle, California, July 26, 1904, where he died on July 8, 1922, aged 94

Buried in Soldiers Home Cemetery

What was his middle name?

BURROW, DAVID J.

Employed by the Quartermaster's Department at Fort Yuma, California, as a teamster from August 16 to November 23, 1865. He was employed in the same capacity from January 11 to February 9, 1866, when he was engaged in driving a wagon load of United States' supplies from Fort Yuma to LaPaz, Arizona Territory.

The reports of persons hired by the Quartermaster's Department at Maricopa Wells in 1866 are missing from the files, and it does not appear that any employees of the Quartermaster's Department were stationed there in 1867.

The records also indicate that a David J. Burrows was employed as a guide at Camp Lowell, Arizona Territory, from September 28 to October 26, 1876.
