as 35 when he registered on May 9, 1882) in Prussia. He was a citisen of the United States by virtue of his father's naturalisation. He enlisted in the Unian Army during the Civil War, and was wounded at the battle of Pea Ridge, a bullet tearing into his liver, after which he was not a robust man. He came to Arisona in Captain Brown's Company, 234 Infantry. On his discharge he entered Mexico, joined the liberal army against Maximillian. He was captain of a battery and fought valiently. From Mexico he want to California and later returned to Arisona as a scout and guide under the United States. He served as United States Marshal in 1876, 1877 and 1878; as a policeman, 1879 - 1880; Chief of Police and Marshal in 1878. , Chief of Police, etc., from 1881 up to his death in 1885.

In recognition of his merits, some citizens of Tucson presented him a gold badge at a ceremony on April 6, 1881, at Levin's Park. The badge weighed 35 carats; was made in Chicago. Mayor John S. Carr made the presentation speech.

He was a member of the Grand Army of the Pepublic and the Masens.

He died of \*pulmonary affection\* on Hovember 7, 1885 at 12:30

afternoon, was the largest ever seen in Tucson. The street in front of his late residence was, for an hour before the cortege began to move, densely grounded by people on foot, on horseback, in carriages and in wagons. . The Grand Army members with fife and drum, headed the procession, after them the Arisona Pieneers, and these were followed by the Pioneer

Hose Company, then the Masonic fraternity, under whose charge the funeral was. It was a crowded funeral -- crowded even up to the grave-yard."

Hotel And yet, strange to say, no probate record has been found.
