PRINK, JOHN RANDOLPH, born in New York, 1880; son of Jefferson Frink; married, Sarah Peacoek, a native of Yorkshire, England, at Les Angeles, California, in 1885; children, John Randelph Jr., George Monroe, Daniel J. and William H.

Neved with his parents to St. Louis, Missouri, where he was reared; crossed the plains to California with a wagon train and arrived in Sacromento in 1849; engaged in mining in northern California until 1852 when he moved to Los Angeles where he established a feed and sale stable; in 1854 he went with his family to San Bernardine County and settled on a farm in San Timetie Canyon; the Los Angeles News of September 16, 1865, stated;

We have received a letter from Mr. James Orant, San Mernardino, in which he informs us that the people of that city have raised by subscription, a sum sufficient to dig several wells between Dos Palmes and the Galerede river, and that himself and My. Frink have been engaged to have the work done immediately. Their teams are now londed with tools and provisions to supply the laborage they are taking out to perform the work. Gurbing for the wells is also being transperted.

In a subsequent issue that newspaper reperied that;

Hessre. Frink and Grant have left San Bernardino provided with barrels, etc., for the purpose of making substantial webering places on the desert, on the La Pas read from San Bernardine to the new gold placers. The Herebants of San Bernardine contributed \$200 to defray the necessary expenses.

The following is taken from a shotch of his life in Guinn's "Eistory of California and the South Coast":

He continued in mining ventures, being associated with the Vulture Mining Company at Wichenburg, Arisona, and acting for some years as its Manager. The gold obtained was carried 001

in a four horse emplage across the depart to San Pedre, themes by beat to the mint in San Prancises. After the mine seased to pay, he went into the stock pusiness at Fidenburg. He was later interested in the mines at Derwin, inye County, where they had a stoop mill, and also interested in the mines near Virginidale, this County. He sold his settle business in Arisens in 1806, and then engaged in reaching in Tulage County, southwest of the town of the same name.

Died in Tulare County, California, on _____ 1802,

aged 62; buried _____ Cemetery.
