LOWTHER, ROBERT JESSE, born at Clarksville, Johnson County, Arkansas, May 18, 1837; son of Jesse R. and Mahalia (Bround) Lowther; attended common school at Clarkville; married Mary Elizabeth Campbell at Austin, Texas, 1874; went to New Mexico as a young man ami was an Indian scout for 5 years, associated with Kit Carson and other frontiersmen; enlisted as Private, Company K, 1st California Infantry, at San Francisco, California, December 27, 1861; occupation when enlisted, miner; marched via Fort Yuma and reached Tucson with the Company May 21, 1862; left Tucson July 20 and arrived at the Rio Grande August 15, 1862; participated in the battle of Adobe Walls, November 25, 1864; honorably discharged at Fort Union, New Mexico, January 2, 1865; resided in Texas after the Civil War; came to Tombstone, Cochise County, A. T., in 1882 where he was a teamster; lived at Bisbee, A. T., 1883-88; worked as a brick mason, teamster and miner and said to have been a peace officer; member, Kehoe Post No. 102, G. A. R. at Bisbee, 1886; went to Alaska at the time of the gold excitement in the nineties and remained there for about 10 years; returned to the State of Washington to reside and thence to Texas; died at Jefferson, Marion County, January 2, 1929, aged 92; buried at Lockett Cemetery, Shiloh, Marion County, Texas; N. C. 2,497,722.
