Listed, Territorial Census, April, 1864, 3d Histrict (Yavapai County) age 35, single, occupation - Photographer, resident in Arizona 5 months; the mining district records show that he bought 25 feet on the "Accidental Lode" from T. W. Hill on June 5, 1864; listed, U. S. Gensus, 1870, at Prescott, age 41, occupation - Glerk; the following items about him were published in the Prescott

Arisona Minor:

September 2h, 1870 - - C. T. Rogers, Agent of the Big Bug Mill Co., reports that the last clean-up at that mill gave better results per ton of ore than any provides run on Eugenia rock. Also that water is again very low and it is reported that the mill will have to shut down for want of fluid.

December 2h, 1875 -- We took a look into the butcher-shop of C. T. Hogers and Co. Last evening, since they have finished papering and painting, and had it not been for the basef and matton hanging down from the hooks we should have almost funcied ourselves in a lady's parlor. Everything is as neat as a pin. This evening they intend to make a fine display of Christmas meats, which will be well worth dropping in to see.

February 19, 1877 -- C. T. Rogers of the Prescott meat market started for Camp Verde this morning to select a large lot of cattle beef which he will drive to this place, where they will be slaughtered for the use of the people in town and the officers, soldiers, etc., at Fort Whipple.

In 1878 he moved to what is now Coconino County and established a cattle ranch with 111 as his brand; Will Barnes states that he homestoaded the land where the town of Williams is located and was appointed the first Postcaster

on June 14, 1881; the Prescott Arizona Enterprise reported on August 7, 1878 that:

The old chief, C. T. Rogers, is fixing up for a trip to his home in the piney woods of San Francisco mountains. He will take barrels of butter and a lot of chickens.

He was mentioned in the Prescott Courier a number of times among

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them being on;

September 2, 1882 - - C. T. Rogers, founder and owner of the new town of Williams has leased a great many lots to persons who have started building.

November 18, 1882 - - C. T. Rogers has a fine store, well filled with goods at Williams. He also does a forwarding and commission business.

November 8, 1889 - - C. T. Rogers, a pioneer Arizonan, who sold crackers here in Prescott in 1864 for \$1 a pound, sugar for 75c, and other things in proportion, is here from Williams.

When announcing his death, the Courier stated:

C. T. Rogers was one of the early residents of Prescott. During 1879 he ran a meat market in the then Kelly and Stephens black, just south of what is now the Brinkmeyer hotel. He was in every way a worthy man and splendid citizen.

Died at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Albert Stover, in Bath, Maine, on September 25, 1903, aged 74; buried Oak Grand Cemetery, in Bath.
