TROJEL, WILLIAM

TROJEL, WILLIAM, born at Jutland, Denmark, on September 27, 1820; married, Teedora Barela at Tubac in the Gadsden Purchase on February 14, 1858; adopted children, Jacob Jeseph and Albertina Angelma (Mrs._____).

Enlisted at New York City, September 13, 1845, to serve 5 years in the Regular Army and assigned to the 6th U.S. Infantry, serving in Companies I and K; occupation when enlisted, Clerk; went by sea from Geverner's Island, New York to New Orleans and marched from there to the Indian Territory and stationed at Fort Towson, Fort Wachita, Fort Cibson and thence to Fort Leavenworth and Fort Kearney on the Oregon route;

Subtinder 13,1850 honorably discharged as Corporal at Fort Scott, Missouri, on May 18, 1852 and assigned to Company C, 6th U.S. Infantry; transferred to Company B, lst U.S. Dragoons and went with the Company to New Mexico; was at Fort Union, M.M. in July, 1856, and marched from there via the Cila Valley to Camp Moore (Calabasas) on the Santa Crux River, arriving in December; engaged with the Company in scouting and exploring in the Gadsden Purchase until honorably discharged on May 18, 1857.

He had reenlisted at Dona Ana, N.M. on May 1, and was assigned to Company D, let U.S. Dragoons then stationed at Camp Moore; the name of the Post was changed to Fort Buchanan and he was stationed there with the Company until March 1, 1859, when he was transferred to Company G of the same Regiment; that company was stationed at Fort Buchanan until December, when it marched via Tucson to Fort Breckenridge where it remained until May 1861; the designation of the Regiment was changed to the let U.S. Cavalry and Troop G, along with all other Federal forces in Arisona was ordered to abandon the Gadsden Purchase and march to the Rio Grande because of the Civil War; he arrived with the Troop at Fort Craig, N.M. in August, where it participated in action against the Confederates on

Pringery 18, 1862, and in the battle of valverdo two days later; honorably discharged by expiration of enlistment, May 1, 1868; L. Y. Briggs of the <u>Poston Transcript</u> who visited San Savier on April 25, 1862, said of him:

We were greated near the shurch by an interesting old pane, the only white man on the Reservation, who gave us a great deal of information about the church, the Indians and the surrounding country. This man, Villiam Tweisl, first went to San Kavier in 1856, under the command of Major Raceh Steen, who was sent, with the fourtcompanies, B.D.G. and K. of the United States Drageon, to protect the few people who were then there against the Indians.

From San Xavier, Major Steen's command moved, in the summer of 1887, to york Buchanan, located near the hot springs on the southeast side of the Santa Rita Mountains. Here they remained until the fall of 1860, when they went to Arivaca, and in July, 'Sl were ordered to pt. Craig, New Mexico. Here Mr. Protel get his discharge.

He lived in the northern part of Mexico until 1878 when he returned, on account of his health, and tried to reclaim his land, but failed, and he was made interpreter of the Indian and Spanish languages for the sub-agencies. He married an Indian (Mexican) of unusual refinement, and is a man who has great influence among the Indians.

Died at Paceon, Pina County, A.T., March 8, 1908, aged 85; buried
