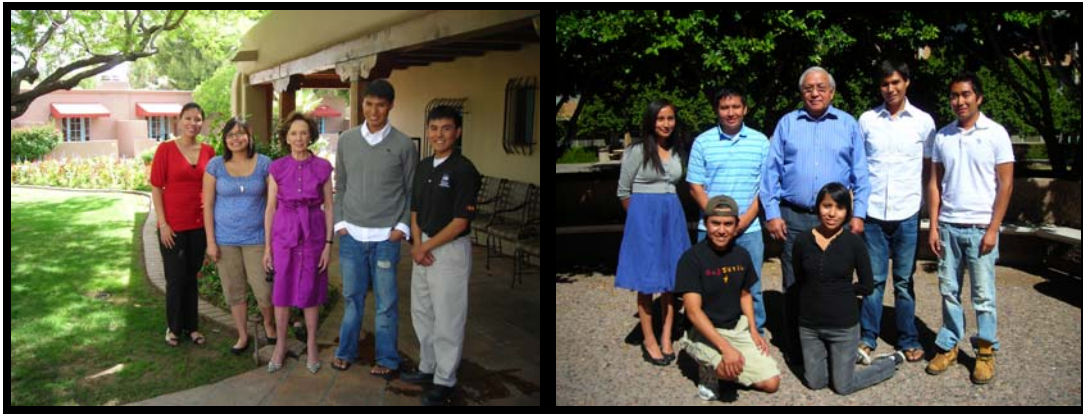


THE NEWTON AND BETTY ROSENZWEIG SCHOLARSHIP
In Collaboration with the
DR. PETERSON ZAH



Newton and Betty Rosenzweig have committed to assisting Native American communities by establishing an endowment at Arizona State University to promote higher education and leadership development among Native American students. The endowment will provide financial support to ASU American Indian undergraduate students. In partnership with Dr. Peterson Zah, Advisor to the President on American Indian Affairs, Office of the President, scholars will be given the opportunity to work in close proximity with the office of Dr. Peterson Zah. It is the Rosenzweigs' and Dr. Zah's hope that these students will choose careers in service professions that will improve the quality of life of Native American communities. Student must be committed to working within and/or on behalf of tribal communities.

Dr. Peterson Zah

Dr. Zah has devoted his life to the service of Native people and is a national leader in Indian education, tribal policy development, legal advocacy, and community development. In 1995, Dr. Zah was recruited by ASU to help address the education concerns of the growing Native American student population and their respective communities. He currently serves as the Special Adviser to ASU President on American Indian Affairs. During his tenure the university's Native American student population has doubled from 672 to over 1,400. He is recognized for his efforts to help increase retention rates. Dr. Zah's office works to develop strategic alliances between Arizona State University and Tribes. These partnerships encourage Tribes to utilize university resources and expertise to advance their communities.

Structure:

The Office of the President American Indian Initiatives will collaborate with other ASU programs and offices to ensure the success of American Indian students and will work with scholars for scheduling and meeting program responsibilities.

The Rosenzweig Scholarship Program will provide 6 undergraduate American Indian students. The Office of President American Indian Initiatives will administer the program.

Funding from Newton and Betty Rosenzweig Leadership Scholarship Endowment will be used to:

1) provide six scholarships annually; the number of Rosenzweig Scholars may increase as available funds allow.

2) two students per class (sophomore, junior, and senior) will be selected as Rosenzweig Scholars and participate in events and activities hosted by Dr. Peterson Zah. Each student will receive a minimum of \$2,500 annually.

Program Activities

1. Encourage students to take an American Indian Studies (if not already enrolled):
 - AIS 180 Intro To American Indian Studies
 - AIS 280 Indigenous Law & Society
 - (other leadership classes/programs will be considered)
2. Will attend a minimum of 3 personal development workshops (time/money management, tutoring, studies skills, etc.) per semester or may be substituted by attending guest lectures/presentations/special events with Dr. Zah and or other designated faculty/staff.
3. Will meet with Dr. Zah and or staff for semester updates
4. Participate in community service projects
5. Encourage students to visit/correspond/update Donor on their progress & experience with the program
