

Attorney Horace H. Appel, who came here from Los Angeles as a colleague of **ex-Governor** Gage in the interest of John F. Harcourt, and who left for his home last night, is a native of this city having been born here in 1862. He left here in 1883 for California, where he attended St. Mary's college at San Jose, afterward going into the legal profession. He was once assistant bookkeeper for the firm of L. Zeckendorf & Co., and was a schoolmate of Sheriff Pacheco. He was appointed to the **military academy** at West Point from this Territory, and remarked yesterday that he was the first appointee to that school from **Arizona**. He went **there** and took the examinations, but on account of the sudden death of his father in Los Angeles, decided to return to the Territory instead of becoming a soldier. He was the first native born **Arizonian** to practice law, being the orator of the day in 1876 at **Levin park**. "Yes, I was here when balogna sausage was selling at seventy-five cents a pound," said he yesterday.
