

YOUNG, JAMES ANSLEY (Coho)

who was born in Kentucky, about 1847.

and Polly Ann (Mrs. _____). (Mrs. Young married C. W. Hardy at
Phoenix, November 5, 1879).

Listed Territorial Census, April, 1864, 3d District (Yavapai
County) age 42, single, born in Tennessee, occupation, Miner, resident
in Arizona 5 months, property valued at \$100; was living at La Paz in
1866; came to the Salt River Valley from Wickenburg 1870; appointed
Justice of the Peace of Maricopa County by Governor Safford, February
21, 1871; also served as a member of the first Board of School Trustees
at Phoenix; he walked with a limp so was given the Spanish nickname of
"Coho".

The announcement of his death in the Arizona Miner is as follows:

J. A. Young, an old pioneer of this Territory and Salt River
Valley, died a few days since at his home in Phoenix of lung
fever. Mr. Young leaves a wife and an interesting family to
mourn his loss.

Died at Phoenix, Maricopa County, A.T., December 4, 1877. Buried at the
Williams or "Cross Cut" Cemetery on the Tempe road east of Phoenix.
